UNIVERSITY OF AUCKLAND

Professor Keith Sinclair returned from leave in England and Canada in May; Professor M. P. K. Sorrenson in August. Professor Nicholas Tarling is on leave in England until May. Mr. R. C. J. Stone has gone to England, where he will be studying urban history.

Dr. D. A. Hamer, M.A. (N.Z.), D. Phil. (Oxon.), was appointed as Associate-Professor. At present he is a lecturer at Lancaster. Dr. Valerie Flint, M.A., B. Phil., D. Phil. (Oxon.), formerly a visiting lecturer, has been appointed a Senior Lecturer. Mr. H. M. Laracy, M.A. (Well.), who has been studying Pacific history at the A.N.U., was appointed to a lectureship.

Mr. P. S. O'Connor and Dr. L. J. Holt have been promoted to Associate Professors.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO

Professor J. H. M. Salmon relinquished the Chair of History in August 1969 in order to take up an appointment at Bryn Mawr College in the United States. Dr. J. H. The *New Zealand Geographer* is published in April and October of each year, and publishes articles, comments and reviews by, and of interest to, geographers. It is primarily concerned with aspects of the geography of New Zealand and the Southwest Pacific, but contains much of interest for a wider audience. The latest issue (April 1970) is oriented towards the Cook Bicentenary with reviews of relevant literature and an article on Tupaia's Map.

Of considerable interest is the October 1969 issue which was specially prepared to celebrate the journal's Twenty-fifth Jubilee. This contains a number of review articles of geographical writing in New Zealand, and provides an excellent history of the subject in New Zealand to that time.

The *New Zealand Journal of Geography* was introduced in 1969 to replace the former *Recorder* of the Society's Proceedings. Published twice yearly, in May and November, it aims specifically to serve the ends and interests of teachers of geography, earth science and social studies.
