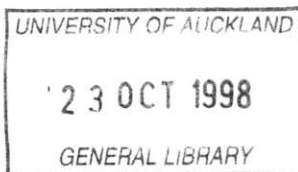

A new publication, *RESEARCH IN ANTHROPOLOGY AND LINGUISTICS*. The first volume, *Protecting Historic Places in New Zealand*, by Harry Allen, is available now. The second, *Consuming Identity: Tourism and Modernity in New Zealand*, by John Taylor, is due in September.

Like its predecessor, *Working Papers in Anthropology, Archaeology, Linguistics and Maori Studies* (discontinued in 1990), this series publishes work in all fields of anthropology and has a New Zealand and Pacific focus, reflecting the interests of Department members. Three or four of these occasional publications will appear each year. Among the next topics are the Raurimu historic construction settlement, Rangitoto Island's interwar holiday communities, the Sigatoka excavations in Fiji, and a reanalysis of an important South Island stone tool collection. The cost per volume is \$NZ20.00–25.00.

*Protecting Historic Places in New Zealand* provides a critique of heritage management and promotes a conservation regime that moves beyond the preservation of icons to foster diverse readings of New Zealand society and history. *Consuming Identity: Tourism and Modernity in New Zealand* traces the fundamental ideological components of tourism-related discourse from the colonial period to the present day.
