Jennifer Ashton completed a PhD on the life of John Webster at the University of Auckland in 2012. The winner of one of the inaugural Auckland War Memorial Museum Library Research Grants, she is at work on a series of articles and a book based on her doctoral thesis.

Caroline Daley is an Associate Professor in the Department of History at the University of Auckland and the University's Dean of Graduate Studies.
