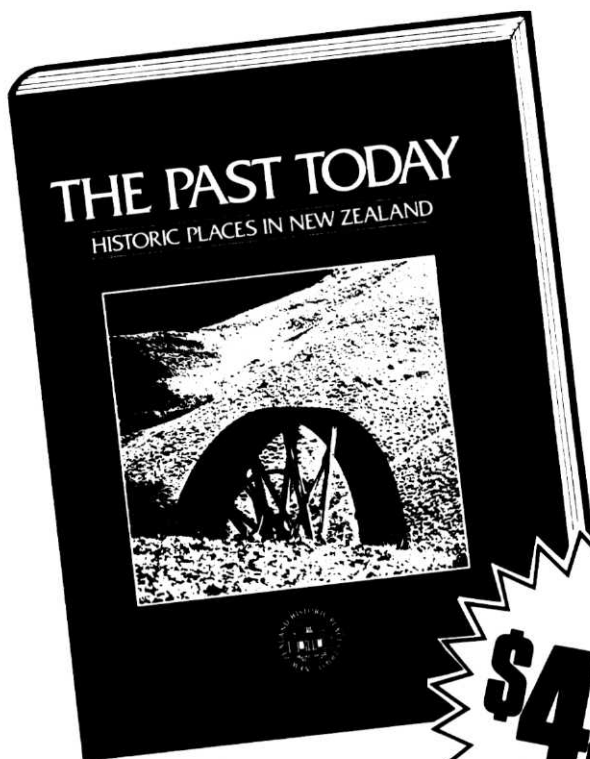

The New Zealand Liberals The Years of Power, 1891-1912

David A. Hamer

The Liberal Party ruled New Zealand for an unbroken twenty-one years. During this time patterns were established which have typified New Zealand politics ever since.

David Hamer's new book is no mere party history, but the first study of a New Zealand government during its entire term of office. It describes the political ideas and practice which led to the significant and well-recognized achievements of the Liberal government; but it traces also the party's gradual demise and its loss of favour with the electorate.

The New Zealand Liberals explores political complexities and interactions at all levels from Premier to elector, from political theorizing to crass political manoeuvring. The parliamentary leaders of the time play a dominant and colourful part; but Professor Hamer has a masterly sense of the broad sweep of political behaviour in a seminal period of New Zealand history.

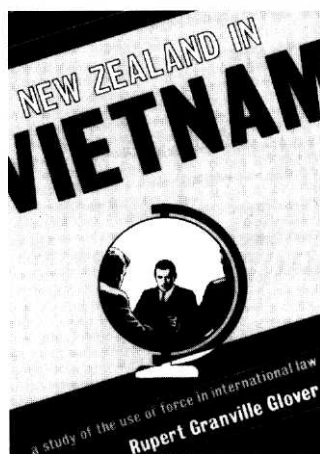
