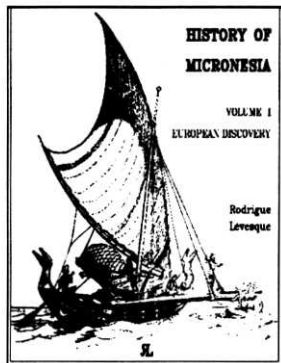

THE NOT SO POOR AN AUTOBIOGRAPHY

Mary Isabella Lee

Edited and introduced by Annabel Cooper

A rare historical document, this is a vivid personal account of the life of a working-class woman in southern New Zealand from the 1880s to the 1920s. Mary Isabella Lee was the mother of the famous Labour politician John A. Lee, and her book, now published for the first time, is in part a rejoinder to his fictionalised version of his childhood in *Children of the Poor*. It provides an interestingly different interpretation of events, from the viewpoint of a woman with little formal education but with a shrewd intelligence and a stubborn determination.

Excellent edited by Annabel Cooper, the book includes a useful introduction, detailed notes and a comprehensive index, as well as 30 fascinating contemporary photographs.
