### Public Release of Ministry Records Deposited with National Archives

On 1 August 1997 the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade released for public access approximately 1,250 volumes of its records previously deposited under restriction with National Archives, Head Office, Wellington. Much of this material is 30 or more years old. Broad subject headings include:

- (Regional Country Series) Africa, East and Southeast Asia, Europe, the Middle East, and the South Pacific;
- (International Organisations) the Commonwealth, FAO, GATT, NATO, SEATO, and the United Nations;
- (Other File Series) New Zealand-United Kingdom trade, visits by dignitaries and officials to and from New Zealand, and World War II.

This release is part of an ongoing process; further release announcements will be made on or about 1 August each coming year.

## *Call For Papers*

With the centenary of Australian federation rapidly approaching, Australians are reassessing their constitution and the significance of colonialism for the nation's future. Issues of republicanism, multiculturalism, gender equity and Aboriginal reconciliation are coming under scrutiny. These issues are not unique to Australia. The histories of imperial practices can be told throughout the world. Other former colonies are rethinking their imperialist legacies; some new colonialist cultures are being created.

In this context, the Australian and New Zealand Law and History Society is organizing its eighteenth annual meeting as an international conference in collaboration with the Canadian Law and Society Association. The ANZLHS is an interdisciplinary group of scholars who share an interest in the connections to be made between history and law.

Offers of papers are now invited on the theme of imperialism, colonialism and the migration of legal cultures, or on other matters relevant to the primary concerns of the Society.
