AWARDS IN ORAL HISTORY

These awards provide financial help for projects using oral resources relating to the history of New Zealand/Aotearoa and this country's close connections with the Pacific. All areas of New Zealand history are eligible although preference will be given to projects which would significantly improve understanding of this country. Projects on the history of the Maori and Pacific Island people in New Zealand are especially welcome. Awards may be made to individuals, groups, communities or institutions. Assistance is not normally available for projects that are eligible for university research funds, nor for university theses. Applicants must normally be resident in New Zealand.

Awards are designed to:

- Provide support to individuals, groups, communities or institutions for a limited period.
- Pay for equipment, travel and other costs related to the project.

Applications close on April 30 each year.
