**Lyndon Fraser** is a Christchurch-based historian who teaches in the School of Social and Political Sciences at the University of Canterbury/Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha. His recent publications include *Castles of Gold: A History of the West Coast Irish* (2007).

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**Giselle Byrnes** is Professor and Chairperson of the Department of History at The University of Waikato, Hamilton, where she is also Pro Vice-Chancellor (Postgraduate Research and Supervision). Her publications include *Boundary Markers: Land Surveying and the Colonization of New Zealand* (2001), *The Waitangi Tribunal and New Zealand History* (2004) and *The New Oxford History of New Zealand* (2009), a revisionist multi-authored general history, of which she is editor. Giselle is currently working on a comparative study examining processes of apology and historical restitution in New Zealand and international contexts.

**Nꝑia Mahuika** teaches history at Te Whare Wānanga o Waikato, and specializes in oral history, and Māori and iwi history and research. He is currently completing his doctoral thesis which explores the form, theory and method of oral tradition and oral history in Aotearoa/New Zealand.

**Sekhar Bandyopadhyay** is Professor of Asian History at Victoria University of Wellington. His primary research interest is nationalism and the minorities in colonial and post-colonial India. He is also interested in the history of Indian migration and the Indian diaspora. His recent books include *Decolonization in South Asia: Meanings of Freedom in Post-Independence West Bengal* (London and New York, 2009) and (editor) *Nationalist Movement in India: A Reader* (New Delhi, 2009). He is currently editing a book on Indians in New Zealand.
